

COMMENTS

Peru and Mexico exchanged goals during the first quarter, Mexico from penalty and extra man goals, while Peru's goals came from penalties and shots from the perimeter. This quarter ended with a 3-3 tie, one that would not last long. The second quarter saw Mexico jump all over Peru at both ends of the pool. They were able to score the first five goals of the quarter and placed a lot of defensive pressure on their opponent, one that Peru wasn't able to decipher. By the end of the quarter, Mexico had a 5 goals lead, one that they never relinquished. After halftime, Mexico just kept the pressure on Peru, not allowing them to mount a consistent offensive attack. At the same time they were very patient with their offense and were able to score on every mistake that Peru made. 

COMMENTS

The second game of this session was between Colombia and Argentina. The winner of the game would earn the final UANA spot at the 2017 Youth World Championship. From the onset of the game, everybody could see that Colombia was all business and that they wouldn't be denied the opportunity to earn a trip to Worlds. Both teams traded goals for the first quarter, working hard to maintain their own scheme of play that has characterized them through the tournament. It was during the second quarter that Colombia took control of the game. Turnovers by Argentina were key to their undoing. They forced the ball to the post but Colombia closed the middle effectively. When they had the chance, Argentina couldn't score from extra man or perimeter shots. This allowed Colombia to take a 8-6 lead in the first half. Colombia went on a tear at the beginning of the second half, scoring three goals in less than 3 minutes. This onslaught was too much for Argentina, whose game came unglued at both ends. They were able to recover in the fourth quarter, coming back from a 5 goal deficit to close the gap to one goal with 36 seconds left. Colombia was able to keep the ball away from their opponent and getting the win. Orozco (#8) led Colombia and the game with 4 goals. Argentina had three players with three goals.



COMMENTS

COMMENTS
