COMMENTS

It was has been the most exciting and close game in the tournament, host team Trinidad and Tobago upended Peru 14-13 in the first game of the afternoon session. The game was very close throughout the four periods. Peru jumped ahead with a center forward shot and an extra man one before Trinidad could break the ice with two extra man goals of their own. The first quarter ended with Peru ahead 5-3. During the second quarter both teams exchanged penalty goals to end the quarter with a 2-2 tie and a 7-5 Peru lead. The second half started with a Peru extra man goal to increase their lead to three goals. From there on both teams were able to score from defensive lapses and turnovers. Peru was able to withstand the crowd’s enthusiasm for the host team to hold on to a three goal lead (12-9) to end the third quarter. The fourth quarter was all Trinidad. They were able to penetrate Peru’s defense from the center forward position, where they scored once, got two goals from exclusions and one penalty shot. It was a see-saw battle for the last three minutes of the game. During this quarter, Latchman (#6) was pure venom for Peru with four goals. The winning goal was scored with 47 seconds left in the game. Peru had a last chance to score a goal but a costly turnover ruined that chance, allowing the home team to win the game and for the crowd to enjoy every minute of the victory. Rodriguez (#10) of Peru was the leading scorer of the game with 8 goals. His team will go against United States tomorrow. Trinidad will play Colombia tomorrow. For this game they we led by Latchman (#6) and Robertson (#10) with five goals each.

COMMENTS

United States continued the dominance of their opponent with a convincing 19-9 win over a very good Argentina team. The key ingredients for USA were the same: very solid strong defense and consistent a error-free offense. The constant pounding of the ball to the center forward was key to so many goals for the USA team. Their center forward, with Pulice (#7) as their leader, accounted for more than half the goals and most of the ejections on their favor. The score would have been by a wider margin if USA would have scored more on their extra man opportunities. The first quarter was a very fast-paced one, with 11 goals been scored (USA-7 and ARG-4). That pace changed in the second quarter. USA started to use a more deliberate attack and use all the shot clock while Argentina could not penetrate the tough man to man defense that USA was employing. The half ended with USA on top 11-5. The third quarter was all USA. They were able to score 5 unanswered goals to increase their lead and seal the game to 15-5. At the end of the quarter Argentina was able to put the ball in the cage to cut the lead to nine goals. The last quarter had both teams exchange goals from penalty shots, extra man situations and counter attacks. The south American team was led in scoring by Giri (#3) with four goals. Bahamas will be their next opponent. USA, who plays Peru in their next game, was once again led by Pulice (#7) with seven goals

COMMENTS

The third game of the afternoon session was between two very aggressive and well-balanced teams in Colombia and Canada. They will have their hands full tomorrow when they go against Brazil.

COMMENTS
